### **MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING**

The School District of Palm Beach County (the District) and the Palm Beach County Classroom Teachers Association (CTA), as evidenced by the respective signatures below, agree to this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) as more specifically set forth herein.

The District has been awarded, by the Mary and Robert Pew Public Education Fund, a grant for School Years 2022-2023, 2023-2024, and 2024-2025. The purpose of this three-year grant is to increase student interest in eSports careers and for students to earn scholarships to college for eSports.

In summary, this project will fund an elective teacher unit for the entire school day for three years that will align with other Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs and the after-school eSports program. The grant also provides professional development, additional hardware, additional eSports coaches, supplies and league competition fees.

This grant is payable upon receipt as follows:

- \$224,614 payable June 1, 2022
- \$135,035 payable June 1, 2023
- \$138,275 payable June 1, 2024

The budget breakdown is attached to this MOU on starting on page 12 of the grant award document.

### **General Provisions**

- j. 9 Sections of Level I; 3 Sections of Level II

- b. Two eSport Teachers (1 grant funded, 1 School funded) 5<sup>th</sup> period
- c. Two eSport Teacher elective supplements (School Funded) 6<sup>th</sup> period
- d. One Head eSport Coach Supplement (grant funded)
- e. One eSport Coach Supplement (grant funded)
- f. Addition of Level IV Course for students who participated in Level III the previous year
- g. Level IV students will become strategist learning how to analyze matches and coaching strategies, build portfolios to achieve internships
- h. Two conferences during the year including FETC, Orlando and one of choice
- i. 6 Section of Level I; 3 Sections of Level II; 3 Sections of Level III; 1 Section of Level IV
- 5. Upon completion, this position will be absorbed into the school's master board and continue as elective classes.


### Introduction:

eSports and the computer gaming industry continues to push past traditional sporting contests and has combined revenues five times larger than NFL, MLB, NBA, and NHL combined! It is quickly becoming a true career path for many of today's high school students with more scholarship opportunities becoming available at colleges every year. Esports also provides students with the academic and technical skills necessary to succeed in future STEM and non-STEM postsecondary learning opportunities and careers. In 2020, Palm Beach Lakes High School was one of the schools to receive a Pew Foundation Grant to explore eSports with the School District. In less than two years, we have built a quality after-school program impacting students at our school through competitive video gaming who are typically not engaged with school. We firmly believe that eSports is the trojan horse to get students engaged with school in a new and exciting way. We align with the district in that we want to engage those students who are typically not engaged with school.

### Project Description:

As we continue to see more and more students interested in eSports across our campus, we are interested in expanding the reach of our program by beginning to integrate components of eSports into

daily teaching and learning. This project will continue to enhance and follow what the district is doing as a whole, including focusing on the entire ecosystem of eSports and not just on playing games. The goal is to get students interested in eSports careers and earn students scholarships to college for eSports. We will continue to focus on the entire ecosystem by focusing on North American Scholastic Esports Federation's (NASEF) model as seen in the graphic to the right. As such, this project is seeking to fund an elective teacher unit for the entire school day for three years that will align with our other CTE programs and the after school eSports program along with



professional development, curriculum writing, additional hardware, additional eSports coaches, supplies, and league competition fees. A summary of what will be included each year is listed below in addition to a full breakdown of the budget.

Year 1 (July 2022 - June 2023):

Year 1 in the program will be a start up year where we will work with as many organizations as possible such as NASEF, Dell/APL, and Electronic Gaming Federation (EGF) to begin building the curriculum for students. As soon as the grant is approved, we will have two eSport teachers, one funded by the grant the other funded by the school. The school will also pay for two 6th period supplements to provide us with 12 sections of eSports electives. The three year grant will allow the principal to phase in the funding for the grant funded position in year four. The principal is confident that this program will be so successful that it will become the most popular elective at the school.

The school will start the first year with two eSports electives with ten sessions of eSports Level I and two sessions of eSports Level II. Students who have been in the after school program already will be eligible for the Level II class without having to take the Level I year.

Prior to the start of school and possibly during the year on Saturdays depending on the timing, the two teachers will work together to build content for the program. We are requesting 160 hours (80 hours each) of time to build the curriculum for eSports Level I and eSports Level II.

Much of the curriculum for this course will be built around a mashup of NASEF's curriculum and CTE coursework that complements the programs already at the school. Students will be introduced to foundational skills needed to pursue a design media pathway and career. Students will establish an understanding of graphic and animation software for the purpose of **obtaining an industry certification** in **Photoshop and Illustrator during eSports Level I**. We have included funding in the budget to

purchase class sets of four novels that incorporate eSports themes and topics into them. These novels are highly engaging and approved by our Library Media Services Department. The novels were also chosen to best reflect the diverse population at our school.

Students will learn career pathways through the NASEF model which will be broken down into smaller chunks and further explored by students. This part of the curriculum is readily available to us through our partnership with NASEF. One example of what this looks like is the graphic to the right which breaks down the "content creators" role into what classes, certification, skills, and careers fit into this role. Students will research and learn more about these throughout each quarter.

Finally, professional development is extremely important when it comes to eSports because of how fast everything is moving in this

world. As such, we have requested funding to two conferences during year one to connect with other schools and districts about eSports as well as bring back any new information to the school to incorporate into the curriculum.

Year 2 (July 2023 - June 2024):

After having a full year of implementation, we will reflect and continue with what worked

well and make adjustments to any area of concern. We will add an eSports Level III course for students who were part of the Level II course in the previous year. The Level II course will have a prerequisite of Level I and the Level II course will have a prerequisite of Level III.

Level III will continue to build upon the student's previous knowledge from Level I and II by adding to the visual design and design concepts. As students progress through this level, it is our hope that they will begin to "specialize" on a specific part of the ecosystem and begin to master it. Students will be required to enter into different competitions based on the specific game(s) that is popular and available. Students will become content creators and learn how to organize competitions.

Another objective of year two is to create avenues towards full sustainability of the program through student entrepreneurship. Hardware will become obsolete and in need of upgrade. Therefore, students in Level II and III will be taught how to raise money through fundraisers and specific eSports marketing efforts. We will create a booster club that will consist of parents and students to support the program financially and through volunteering.

Health and Wellness is paramount to a successful eSports program. In Level II, we introduced students to the NASEF Growth. Activity. Mindfulness.

Environment, Relationships, and Sustenance
(G.A.M.E.R.S.) model. In Level III, students will demonstrate mastery of the model. See graphic to the right for more details. To succeed in the world of eSports requires more than just practice and talent. Successful players who use the NASEF model know that the choices they make each day can make a good play and win the game. Students who have a high sense of well-being have fewer absences, are more focused and have higher achievement in school.
